A Brief History

STAGE THE CHANGE was founded in 2013 through the Hauppauge High School Drama program. After positive reception throughout the community, the "Anti-Bully Project"—a series of student written vignettes meant to address bullying, peer pressure, healthy relationships, and other sensitive topics — proceeded to receive recognition throughout New York State from countless theatre, education, and social issue organizations.

Founding Director Ruthie Pincus was thrilled to find that her students were not only capable of producing theatre to begin conversations but eager to write and share their own perspectives. Pincus recognized the potential to expand beyond the high school setting and explore other human rights issues. What arose was a one-day annual theater conference, held at Tilles Center for the Performing Arts on the campus of Long Island University in Brookville, New York. The conference is attended by high school and college students, educators, arts professionals and community members and includes panel discussions, interactive workshops, keynote speakers, and student performances and serves as a launching point for new works created by students to showcase in their communities and inspire change in the world. In 2015, Stage the Change expanded its focus to include dance and, in 2017 added film. Attendance has increased from 276 participants in 2013 to 819 participants in 2019.

Conference guest speakers have included Tony-Award winning Broadway actor **Gavin Creel**; Broadway & television actress/activist **Jessica Hecht**; four-time Tony-Award winning playwright **Terrence McNally**; Tony-award winning producer **Tom Kirdahy**; **Jeanine Tesori**, composer of Broadway's Fun Home, Shrek and Thoroughly Modern Millie. Award Winner and activist **Anna Deavere Smith**; Broadway actor and playwright **John Cariani** (Almost Maine, Something Rotten);

2020 programs will expand to include a Summer Ambassador program. This program will invite students from the tri-state area to participate in a one-week intensive program, led by theater professionals. Participants will learn leadership skills and develop works of socially mindful theater to be presented in their home communities in 2020-21.

Stage the Change is co-sponsored by Tilles Center for Performing Arts and Hauppauge Public Schools. The annual conference is hosted at Tilles Center on the campus of LIU Post.

About the Conference

The annual conference strives to cultivate socially mindful artists. It is attended by over 800 high school and college students, educators, arts professionals and community members, participants are challenged to find new ways to use their voices. The 4 different sections of the conference reflect this goal:

- A keynote speaker
- Presentations of juried socially mindful student-created works of theater, film and dance
- Interactive breakout sessions for students and educators
- Panels with theatre, film, and dance professionals which explore how the arts can bring about social change



Workshop facilitators and guest speakers are professional actors, directors, film-makers and dancers who focus their work around social justice issues.
